**Professor David Boerner, Commission Chair
Seattle University School of Law
Citizen Representative**

Professor David Boerner is a member of the law faculty of the Seattle University School of Law. He currently serves as Chair of the Washington Sentencing Guidelines Commission. He has served as Chair of the Ethics Committee and the Character and Fitness Committee of the Washington State Bar Association.

He was named the “Outstanding Lawyer of 2002” by the King County Bar Association, in 2004, he received the Award of Merit from the Washington State Bar Association; and in 2006 received the Excellence in Diversity Award from the Washington State Bar Association.

**John Clayton
Assistant Secretary, Washington State Department of Social and Health Services, Juvenile Justice
and Rehabilitation Administration**

John Clayton is a Senior Executive who invested most of his professional career in the leadership of human service programs. He has served as the Assistant Secretary for the Washington State Juvenile Justice and Rehabilitation Administration (JJ&RA) since April of 2007. JJ&RA administers facilities and programs for juvenile offenders.

Prior to this appointment, he served as the Director for the Community Services Division within Washington State’s Department of Social and Health Services since October 2004. With over 2,800 employees, the Community Services Division administers cash, food and medical assistance programs through a network of over sixty Community Service Offices and Customer Service Centers strategically located throughout the state.

Before coming to Washington in 2004 John had been the Director of the Arizona State Department of Economic Security. The agency employed more than 12,000 staff and provided a vast array of human and children’s services programs including employment readiness training, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, food assistance, child protection, child support, child care, refugee assistance, unemployment insurance, aging/adult services, adult protection, and services to people with disabilities.

His civic and professional activities include working with the American Public Human Services Association, Child Welfare League of America, YMCA, and the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators. John is also involved in youth mentoring and coaching youth athletics. Throughout his career, John has followed four golden rules whether as a direct service staff or a manager: 1. Be bold. 2. Never fail to act. 3. Keep your promises. 4. Make a difference.

John is committed to providing excellent customer service. He strongly believes the key to this is capable and committed staff. John is dedicated to providing training and development opportunities that enlighten, encourage, empower and equip staff and an organization to understand and respond to the needs of youth and families at the highest possible level.

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Sheriff Paul A. Pastor
Pierce County, Washington

The Pierce County Sheriff's Department consists of 331 law enforcement officers, 334 Corrections Officers and 120 civilian personnel serving in Washington State's second largest County.

Prior to taking this position, he served as Chief of the Department's Operations Bureau in charge of all law enforcement operations (1996 – 2000), Undersheriff for the Clark County Washington Sheriff's Office (1993 - 1996) and Chief of Police for the city of Everett, Washington (1991 - 1992). From 1986 to 1991, he served at the rank of Inspector for the Pierce County Sheriff's Department.

In the early 1980's, he was in charge of state staff at the Washington Criminal Justice Training Academy where he also managed the Loaned Executive Program and Washington Crime Watch. He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Pomona College as well as two Master's degrees and a Doctorate from Yale University.

He has lectured in several programs at the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia and has received two special commendations from the Director of the FBI for his contributions to law enforcement management training.

He is a graduate of the FBI's National Executive Institute and is a Senior Fellow in the American Leadership Forum.

He helped design the national model procedures for policing mass civil disturbance after the World Trade Organization riot in Seattle and also consulted to the International Olympic Security Committee in Salt Lake City in 2001. He serves on state and national committees for emergency mobilization, ethics and intelligence and in 2004 helped develop the National Sheriff's Association Weapons of Mass Destruction training program. In addition, he helped develop the Washington State law on police use of lethal force and the Northwest Law Enforcement Executive Command College.

Dan Satterberg
King County Prosecuting Attorney

Dan Satterberg, 54, was elected King County Prosecuting Attorney in November 2007 to succeed his longtime friend and mentor, the late Norm Maleng. He has served on the SGC for six years.

Dan served as Chief of Staff for Norm Maleng for 17 years, and was responsible for the management and operation of the Prosecuting Attorney's Office, including budget, human resources, technology, legislative and policy matters. The Prosecuting Attorney's Office today employs more than 230 attorneys, 268 staff, and has a budget of over \$63 million.

Before 1990, Dan was a trial attorney in the Criminal Division, where he spent rotations in the Special Assault Unit, Drug Unit, and served as the office's first gang prosecutor in 1988.

Dan was born and raised in South King County and attended Highline High School. His father was a lawyer in White Center and his mother was a nursing instructor at Highline Community College. He graduated from the UW undergraduate school (Political Science and Journalism) and the UW Law School, where he met his wife Linda, a corporate lawyer.

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**Senator Pam Roach
Washington State Senator**

Senator Pam Roach chaired the Senate Law and Justice (Judiciary) Committee from 1997-1998. As chair Senator Roach led the successful effort to bring .08 to Washington State. As an original member of the Governor's Juvenile Justice Taskforce Senator Roach was the Senate prime sponsor on the landmark Juvenile Justice Reform Act of 1997.

Senator Roach has supported legislation to keep sex predators out of our neighborhoods to protect our families. She prime sponsored the Statewide Automated Victim Information and Notification System (SAVIN) which allows crime victims to obtain 24 hour status on offender's custody. In 2008 Senator Roach supported legislation to keep pornography out of prisons. As a current member of the Governor's Council on Substance Abuse, she has been a leader in cracking down on meth crimes. She is a supporter of the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms which enables law abiding citizens to protect themselves against violent criminals. She understands police cannot be everywhere.

The Evergreen Freedom Foundation ranked Senator Roach as the number one Senator in promoting open government. She was named the Washington State Council of Police Officers Legislator of the Year in 1996, 1997, 1998, and 1999 as well as the 1995 Senate Republican of the Year. "Mothers Against Drunk Driving" recognized her legislative efforts in 1997. She chaired the Senate Children & Family Services Committee from 1991-1992 and the Senate Government Operations and Elections Committee from 2003-2004.

Pam and her husband, Jim, live on a small farm in rural Auburn. They have five children and thirteen grandchildren.

**Hon. Janice E. Ellis
Snohomish County Superior Court**

Judge Janice E. Ellis graduated from Dartmouth College in 1981 and Northeastern University School of Law in 1987. She began her practice with the Seattle firm of Lane Powell Moss & Miller in 1987 and moved to the Snohomish County Prosecuting Attorney's Office in 1990, where she worked in both the criminal and civil divisions of the office until 1995.

Judge Ellis was a member of the Torts Division of the Washington State Office of the Attorney General from 1995 to 1999, and continued as a Special Assistant Attorney General until 2001. She also served as a Mandatory Arbitration Rules arbitrator and a Guardian Ad Litem during that period of her career. Judge Ellis was elected Prosecuting Attorney for Snohomish County in 2002 and took office on January 1, 2003. She ran unopposed in 2006, and was honored with the Snohomish County Bar Association's Attorney of the Year award in 2009. Judge Ellis served as the Prosecuting Attorney for the Tulalip Tribes from December 1, 2009, until she was appointed to the bench by Governor Gregoire in December 2011.

Judge Ellis began her service on the Snohomish County Superior Court bench on January 3, 2012. Judge Ellis has served the community in many ways, notably through volunteer participation on a number of local boards, including the Dawson Place Child Advocacy Center Board of Directors, the YMCA Board of Trustees, and the Deaconess Children's Services Board of Directors. During her tenure as Prosecuting Attorney, she was Chair of the Governor's Council on Substance Abuse, and served on the Attorney General's Operation Allied Against Meth Task Force.

Judge Ellis has two children and resides in east Snohomish County.

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**Hon. Catherine D. Shaffer
King County Superior Court**

Judge Catherine D. Shaffer is a King County Superior Court Judge in Seattle, Washington, a position she has held since November 2000. She has served as a judge in the Criminal, Civil and Family Law Divisions of the King County Superior Court and has presided over a number of complex civil and criminal cases.

Judge Shaffer has served as a Governor, chair of the Bylaws Committee and an Executive committee member for the American Judges Association (AJA), and was just elected as Secretary. She is also co-chair of the AJA Education Committee and Domestic Violence Committee. She has served as past chair of the Washington Superior Court Judges Association (SCJA) Legislation Committee and Criminal Law & Rules Committee, past President of the King County Law Library Board, and past co-chair of the Washington State Bar Association Access to Justice Board's Impediments Committee.

Judge Shaffer is a faculty member at the National Judicial College and the Washington State Judicial College, and an Instructor in Trial Advocacy at the University of Washington. She received her J.D. from Columbia School of Law, where she served on the Law Review, and her B.A. from Wellesley College. Her awards include the 2007 White Ribbon Award from the Alliance of People with disAbilities and Access to Justice Judicial Leadership Award, the 2012 King County Washington Women Lawyers Presidents Award, and the 2013 American Judges Association Judge Bob Jones Memorial Award.

**Lynne DeLano, Chair
Indeterminate Sentence Review Board**

Lynne DeLano has a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of California at Davis and a Master's in Public Administration from the University of South Dakota.

Lynne was initially appointed by Governor Christine Gregoire as Chair of the Indeterminate Sentence Review Board in January 2010. Governor Jay Inslee reappointed Lynne to her second term as Chair in April 2014. Lynne has over 30 years' experience working in corrections, beginning as a correctional officer in South Dakota's women's prison and ultimately serving as that state's first Secretary of its new Department of Corrections from 1989 – 1995. Lynne worked in private corrections in Washington State, and subsequently served in several top administrative positions in the Washington Department of Corrections over an 8-year period.

Lynne and her husband lived overseas in Italy and Turkey from 1997 to 1999, during which time she taught criminal justice classes for the University of Maryland. She and her husband also served in the Peace Corps in Romania from 2006-2008.

Kimberly N. Gordon
Criminal Defense Attorney

Kimberly Gordon defends the criminally accused and the constitution. She has successfully litigated everything from misdemeanors to complex frauds and serious felony cases in Washington's city, state, and federal courts.

In addition to the Commission, Governor Inslee appointed Kim to Washington's Justice Reinvestment Task Force. She is a current member of the Criminal Justice Act Standing Committee for the Western District of Washington, and served on that jurisdiction's Local Criminal Rules Review Committee in 2013. Kim served as president of the Washington Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers in 2012, and was a long-term Co-Chair of WACDL's Legislative Committee. In 2011, she received WACDL's President's Award, in recognition of her distinguished service to the criminal defense bar.

Kim is a founding partner of Gordon & Saunders PLLC, a firm dedicated to the representation (pre- and post-conviction) of individuals charged with crimes. She effectively argued numerous felony appeals for the Washington Appellate Project, began her trial practice at The Defender Association (becoming the Misdemeanor Supervisor in 2002), and was a member of the criminal defense team at Schroeter, Goldmark and Bender. Her education includes Hastings College, Tulane Law School, and the National Criminal Defense College.

Kim's has been repeatedly named a "Super Lawyer" and one of the "Top Attorney's in Washington" in the area of criminal defense. She has lectured on criminal defense and criminal justice policy at a wide range of institutions and organizations, including the University of Washington School of Law, Seattle University School of Law, National Legal Aid and Defender Association, National Institute of Trial Advocacy, Washington Defender Association, Washington Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, King County Bar Association, and Washington State Bail Agents Association.
