Optimizing ACS Operations

Reducing Data Collection Costs

- Immediate need to focus on reducing rising field data collection costs
- ACS program is concentrating on short term implementation projects using administrative records and third-party data sources
 - To inform field data collection contact strategy
 - Operational decisions, such as when to decrease or stop field interview efforts

- Prioritizing Contacts by Geographic Area
- Predicting Vacancy Status
- Adapting Contact Efforts in the CAPI Workload


Future Projects

- Using administrative records to reduce respondent burden and improve the quality of ACS data
- Adding an internet self-response option to the group quarters data collection operation



Ensuring Quality Content—2022 ACS Content Test

This test is conducted approximately every five years to improve quality of existing questions or test the addition of new questions.

Ensuring Quality Content — Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) Research

The ACS received an FY23 appropriation of \$10 million to research adding questions about sexual orientation and gender identity (SOGI) to the survey

The ACS SOGI test will have two components:

Cognitive Testing

- Focus on Spanish translation
- Will begin this fiscal year

Field Testing

- Focus on assessing (within household) proxy reporting
- Exploring testing placement, question wording
- Will test self-response; hoping to also test CAPI
- Field test will likely occur in 2024



The American Community Survey (ACS) is the premier source of detailed information about the nation's people and housing. It is an ongoing survey that provides vital information each year throughout the 50 states, District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. Information from the survey generates data that help inform how trillions of dollars in federal funds are distributed each year. The ACS is unique in its ability to produce estimates for a wide range of topics for multiple geographies including the nation, states, counties, American Indian Areas, Alaska Native Areas, Hawaiian Home Lands, and smaller areas such as census tracts and block groups. 

The American Community Survey Recent Data Releases

Selected Population Tables & the American Indian and Alaska Native Tables (SPT/AIANT)

- Released every five years and provides the greatest level of statistical detail for specific population groups
- Selected Population Tables
 - Available for selected race, Hispanic origin, tribal, and ancestry populations
- American Indian and Alaska Native Tables
 - Available for selected tribal populations
- The 2017-2021 ACS 5-year SPT/AIANT release provide estimates for 1,353 selected race, tribal, Hispanic origin, and ancestry groups -- including 1,058 individual tribal groups

The American Community Survey ACS Geography Changes

- Boundary changes typically occur due to annexation, disincorporation, and geocoding updates
- Most ACS geographies reflect the 2020 Census boundary changes:
 - Census tract definitions and census designated places (updated in the 2016-2020 ACS 5-year)
 - Zip Code Tabulation Areas (ZCTAs) (updated in the 2017-2021 ACS 5-year)
 - Public Use Microdata Sample Areas (PUMAs) and Urban Areas (updated in the 2022 ACS 1-year)
- Other geography changes for the 2022 ACS data releases include:
 - 118th Congressional Districts
 - 2022 State Legislative District Boundaries
 - Connecticut counties replaced with 9 planning zones



Geography Boundaries by Year

Legal Areas

Legally defined geographic areas used in the ACS are updated on an annual basis from a variety of programs, including: the Boundary and Annexation Survey (BAS), the Redistricting Data Program and the School District Review Program.

Statistical Areas

For **statistical areas**, boundary changes are mostly associated with updates from each decennial census. Statistical areas are designed to have stable boundaries over time.

The American Community Survey Comparison Guidance

Do	Do Not
Use ACS for population characteristics (i.e., percents, means, medians, rates)	Use ACS for population totals (instead use decennial census or the Population Estimates Program)
Compare similar period lengths (i.e., 1-year to 1-year and 5-year to 5-year)	Compare estimates from different period lengths (i.e., 1-year to 5-year)
Conduct statistical testing when making comparisons between estimates	Look at estimates alone to decide if they are higher or lower than one another
Compare across geographies and population subgroups using 2022 ACS	Expect ACS estimates to match decennial census counts or estimates from other surveys
